
#### Police Department **Promotes Three**


Grady Curtis, Joe Phillips and Ralph Taylor, Florence policemen, have been promoted to the rank of Lieutenant.

Within the next 90 days bids will be invited for the construction of three new buildings on the rolling, wooded campus of Flor-ence State College. Two will be dormitories, one for men and one for women; the third will be the two-story Student Union in which will be housed the campus diningroom, kitchens, private dining areas and conference rooms, with a great hall, The Little Drug, Loin's Den, a faculty lounge and the post-office occupying the first

The new men's dormitory will be built into the hillside and will face Circular Drive. There will be accomodations for 224 male students. Each floor will have study and lounge areas and will be serviced by an elevator system.

#### DEADLINE TO PAY POLL TAX SATURDAY

Weaver Fuqua, Jr., Lauderdale County tax collector, reminds that all persons subject to the payment of the poll tax and who have not paid for 1959, should make payment by January 31 since February 1, the date prescribed by law, falls on Sunday. However, any person who fails to make payment at the office of the Tax Collector, may mail payment on Sunday as any mail received with the February 1 post mark will be acceptable.

All poll tax payments, Mr. Fugua pointed out, go to the maintenance fund of Lauderdale County's schools and, as of today, 2,900 have paid their poll taxes for the current year. To be eligible to vote in any election this year, poll tax payments must be made as above set out.

#### Bonds Would Be **Amortized From** Power Revenue

Tuesday the House of Represen-tatives received a bill to permit the Tennessee Valley Authority to issue its own revenue bonds to finance power operations. The bill was sent to the Public Works Committee.

The legislation is sponsored by Reps. Clifford Davis, (D. Tenn.,) Chairman of the Public Works
Flood Control Committee, and
Rep. Robert E. Jones, (D. Ala.,)
also a member of the Public Works
Committee. A similar bill was introduced by Rep. Thomas Aber-nethy, (D., Miss.)

No doubt a host of other bills by T.V.A. proponents will be offered, Davis and Jones said in a joint statement. We have high hopes that this legislation will be considered at an early date."

The bill introduced today is similar to the one which passed the Public Works Committee in the last Congress, but was not reported out to the House by the Rules Committee.

"This legislation would permit the T.V.A. to operate at maximum efficiency, Davis and Jones said, "by issuing bonds not exceeding \$750,000,000 at any one time to assist in financing its power program. The bonds would be amortized out of power revenue. 

One of the most ruthless foes of the TVA, observes this district's representative Bob Jones, is the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. Because of its ability to get national publicity and through its own publications, the impression is widespread that all Chamber of Commerce members are TVA

Pope Seeks Christian Unity

Return to the fold of the Eastern Orthodox Church's 129 million members was seen as a prime object of the conclave. The Pope did not announce the date for the beginning of the council. Because of the gathering's great size and possibly long duration, the preparation may take many months.

#### Italian Cabinet Quits

The cabinet of Italian Premier Amintore Fanfani decided Monday to resign. Fanfani, 50, head of the Christian Democratic Party, went to the Quirinale Palace to submit his resignation to President Giovanni Gronchi. The cabinet voted to quit following seven precarious months in office and the resignation last week of Labor Minister Ezio Vigorelli, a member of the Democratic Socialist minority.

#### Drive For Hawaiian Statehood

Spurred by the admission of Alaska, a congressional drive to make Hawaii the 50th state got under way Monday before the House insular affairs committee in Washington. Secretary of the Interior Fred Seaton, an outspoken advocate of Hawaii statehood, was called as the first witness at a hearing.

#### Bergman Gets Custody of Children

A French court last Saturday awarded to Ingrid Bergman custody of the three children born of her marriage to Italian film director Roberto Rossellini. The court, in a provisional ruling, however, granted visiting rights to Rossellini and decreed the children attend an Italian school in Paris.

#### Thousands Left Homeless By Floods

Thousands were left homeless in areas hit by water overflows in Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, and West Virginia during the week. At least 5,000 mine workers were idled by flood shutdown of 12 mines in eastern Pennsylvania. Damage was in the millions of dollars following a midweek assault from storms that loosesned flood water in the Midwest and Northeast.

#### Virginia Hit By Integration Ruling

Two federal courts in separate rulings struck new blows at Virginia's crumbling anti-integration program Friday by strengthening desegregation orders for Arlington and Norfolk schools. The U.S. 4th Circuit Court of Appeals ordered Arlington County officials to admit four Negro children to the allwhite Stratford Junior Hiigh School Feb. 2-the start of the new term and about the same time, a special three-judge federal court issued a permanent injunction prohibiting state officials and Norfolk school authorities from closing any public school or grade solely because of integration while other schools are kept open on a segregated basis.

#### Jet Airline Service Launched

American Airlines launched the nation's first transcontinental jet passenger service Sunday with a Boeing 707 flight from Los Angeles to New York that shrank the nation by almost onehalf. The plane made the flight in a new unofficial commercial record time of 4 hours and 10 minutes.
