



An Excellent Program

CBS's auto safety series, narrated by Edward R. Murrow, on Monday nights has been a most effective instrument in bringing forcefully to the American public first hand accounts of the terrible traffic toll of our highways and how this is being reduced through the application of common sense plus a more rigid clampdown on offenders.

The photographers of CBS and the network's correspondents worked night and day to film these accidents so that the viewer might see some of the causes which included drunken drivers, excessive speed, slow drivers and panicky and inexperienced drivers.

They discussed such things as too much horsepower and speed built into today's vehicles and such safety measure as safety belts as standard equipment. Other topics included confusing and conflicting traffic regulations and the better designing of cars for safety.

Traffic accidents in a number of states are already showing the result of safety education and more is promised if the public will cooperate. That is the biggest problem of all.

The count at midnight at the end of the 78-hour holiday period that started at 6 p.m. Friday showed 474 killed in motor vehicle accidents in the United States. The holiday estimate had been 510. This was the lowest toll for the three day period since Christmas 1949 when the total number of fatalities was 413. In the light of several million more vehicles on the highways this Christmas over Christmas 1949 this is a considerable improvement.

In the light of what we could do if we tried it is a national disgrace. We need more programs like the CBS series.



Connally Gets Navy Berth

President-Elect John F. Kennedy announced Tuesday the selection of John B. Connally as Secretary of the Navy. Connally, 43-year-old attorney and long-time political associate of Vice President-Elect Lyndon B. Johnson, served in the Navy during World War II, entering the service as an ensign in 1941 and ordered to inactive duty in 1946 as a lieutenant commander. The appointment was made after Kennedy consulted with Defense Sec.-Designate Robert S. McNamara and Johnson.

MacArthur Memorial Established

General of the Army Douglas MacArthur has accepted an invitation from the City of Norfolk for the establishment of a memorial that will house his personal papers and war memories. The city plans to spend nearly half a million dollars for the renovation of its 111-year-old courthouse, soon to be vacated and has tentative plans to landscape the courthouse block and rename it "MacArthur Square."

Negro Rescued, Dies From Clot

Harry Miller, 44, a Negro workman who was rescued last week after spending 20 bitter-cold hours trapped in a caved-in cistern, died Thursday apparently from a "blood clot." The workman was pulled out of the cistern, located about 45 miles from Memphis, after rescue teams of both Negro and whites worked around the clock in what was believed to be the coldest night of the year. He was the father of five children.

Seamen Rescued From Tanker

An American tanker, the Pine Ridge, which snapped in two Wednesday during a howling gale in the Atlantic, was struck with such sudden disaster there wasn't time to dispatch an S.O.S. Twenty-eight of 29 crewmen trapped on the tossing stern were rescued by Navy helcopters. One man remained aboard to guard against salvagers. Little hope was held for the eight others who were aboard the ill fated vessel; they apparently either were swallowed by the mountainous seas or went down under the capsized bow.

Submerged Sub Fires Missile

The nuclear submarine Robert E. Lee successfully launched a Polaris missile while submerged beneath the Atlantic 30 miles off Cape Canaveral, Thursday. Compressed air ejected the rocket from one of 16 vertical launching tubes which stand in pairs down the broad spine of the 380-foot submarine. The Lockheed-made missile spurted to the surface, ignited an instant later and raced to its target 1300 miles down the Atlantic range. Cmdr. Ruben F. Woodail of Springville, Ala., directed the launching.

• News editors of one of the press service's member newspapers and radio and television stations across the nation have chosen President-elect John F. Kennedy as "Newsmaker of 1960." Nikita Khrushchev, the Soviet prime minister who made pienty of headlines of another sort, came in second in the editors' judgment. Other winners in the Newspaper Press survey of its 3800 members were: Religion, Pope John XXIII; business and industry, George Romney; science, Wernher von Braun; labor James Hoffa; literature, Allen Drury; entertainment, the late Clark Gable, and sports, Floyd Patterson.

 President elect John F. Kennedy will establish his White House - away - from - the-White House at a 400-acre Virginia estate which is owned by Mrs. Raymond Tartiere of Washington. The estate is located one and a half miles south of Middletown, Va., in Fauquier County and just 32 miles from Washington where Kennedy will carry out his duties. The estate, Glen Ora, is a rambling, French-provincial, two-story mansion of faded yellow stucco, which has six bedrooms and five baths. There is a guest house, a 50x23foot swimming pool, stables, barns, a greenhouse, smokehouse, springhouse and tennis court along with several animals.

 France successfully staged its third nuclear test Tuesday, exploding a small device that officials hope will clear the way for both tactical and giant thermonuclear weapons. The third test, which came 10 months after the first, was fired at Reggane, deep in the Sahara, from atop a tower. French officials said the device was of several kilotons in power which is equivalent to 1000 tons of TNT. No details were given, but presumably it was of plutonium as were the previous two. "Red Jerboa" is the name which was given to the third device.
